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Scope

The VESDA-E VEA-040-A00 Product Guide provides a comprehensive description of the VESDA-E VEA-040-A00 detector and its accessories.

This guide introduces the VEA-040-A00 features, technical specifications and gives an understanding of its components and their function. You will also find instructions on installing, cabling and powering up the detector.

This guide is for anyone involved with the design, maintenance and purchasing of a VESDA-E system. It is assumed that anyone using this product has the knowledge and appropriate certification from local fire and electrical authorities.

The product is compliant with EN 54-20 sensitivity requirements provided the following conditions are met:

- For a Class A detector, the sensitivity must be set to HIGH
- · For a Class B detector, the sensitivity must be set to ENHANCED
- For a Class C detector, the sensitivity must be set to STANDARD

The Approvals setting on the Module configuration page must be set to EN54-20 using VSC-E version 3.06.00 build 4744 or later. (See Section 5.5.5).

The product is compliant with EN 54-20 airflow monitoring requirements provided that the Airflow Fault Sensitivity is set to NARROW. The Flow Fault Delay must be set to no longer than 4 minutes.

The sampling tube used during installation must comply with the requirements of EN 54-20 Clause 5.7 Mechanical Strength of the Pipework which requires that the tube has been tested to the limits below:

- Compression resistance: 125 N
- Shock resistance: 0.5 kg, height of fall 100 mm
- Temperature range:-15°C to +60°C

Japanese Installations

To comply with Japanese local code requirements the WiFi capability shall be disabled.

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1 Introduction

The VESDA-E VEA-040-A00 is an aspirating smoke detector (ASD) that provides early warning of fire conditions by drawing air samples through a multi-hole addressable microbore tube air-sampling network.



Figure 1-1: VESDA-E VEA-040-A00 Aspirating Smoke Detector

The detector easily interfaces with fire warning and fire suppression release systems, and can be integrated into a building management system (BMS).

1.1 Features

The VEA-040-A00 detector contains the following features:

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2 Product Information

2.1 Detector Components




Figure 2-1: Detector components

The VEA-040-A00 detector contains field-replaceable Filter, Pump, Smoke Sensor Module and Rotary Valve components. These are shown below in Figure 2-1.

Refer to Chapter 7 for further information regarding maintenance scheduling and availability of spare parts.

2.2 How the VEA-040-A00 works

The VEA-040-A00 detector draws a combined air sample from a network of microbore flexible tubing from all sampling points in the protected area, then filters and analyzes the sample in laser detection chambers in the smoke sensor module. When smoke particles are detected and the smoke level reaches set alarm thresholds, the system will raise appropriate alarm conditions. After a Fire 1 alarm is raised, the system will sequentially scan the sampling locations via the rotary valve to identify one or more sampling locations with the fire alarm event. To assist in investigation of the source of a fire, if the system is in Pre-Alarm, the user can initiate a smoke scan of all sampling locations.

The VEA-040-A00 uses a vacuum pump which provides superior detection times for long tube lengths. The system monitors the airflow within the installation, allowing detection of breakages or blockages of individual sampling points and sampling tubes at set intervals, with faults indicated on the display and to the monitoring equipment.

Alarms and fire location can be signaled via Relays and VESDAnet. Ethernet and WiFi can be used for configuration and secondary monitoring, and a USB interface is provided for field installation and maintenance. The optional Relay StaX module can be used to identify and signal fire source locations on a fire panel loop. Refer to Section A.1 for further information.

A series of LEDs display Alarm, Trouble, Disable and detector power on status. A button allows the user to Reset or Disable the detector.

2.3 Front Panel

The VEA-040-A00 detector provides the following information and control capability:

- Status LEDs: Alert, Action, Fire 1, Fire 2, Disabled, Fault and Power.
- · Controls: Reset and Disable button.

2.3.1 Status LEDS

The VESDA-E VEA-040-A00 detector features a range of LED Indicators which illuminate when their respective activation conditions are met.

Notes:

• The LEDs are tested during the power up cycle. To manually test the LEDs, run the Lamp Test using Xtralis VSC or iVESDA.

2.3.2 RESET / DISABLE Button



Figure 2-2: Reset / Disable Button

Resetting the detector unlatches all latched alarms and faults, returns relays to their normal state and clears the active event list in Xtralis VSC or iVESDA.

• To reset the detector, press this button once.

To assist in determining the location of a fire, when the system is reset and if the system is in Pre-Alarm, the detector will initiate a smoke scan of all sampling locations. When the system is reset and there is no alarm condition, the detector will perform a flow scan to ensure that there are no remaining flow fault conditions. Flow scan progress can be observed using the detailed status screen of Xtralis VSC (refer to Section 8.1.1 on page 101) and, if required, the flow scan can be canceled using Xtralis VSC.

Disabling the detector disables all the output relays associated with the detector. The pump remains active.

 To disable the detector, press and hold the button for approximately 4 seconds, until the DISABLED LED illuminates continuously.

- To re-enable the unit, press and hold the button for approximately 4 seconds, until the DISABLED LED deactivates continuously.
- While the detector is disabled, any faults may be cleared by pressing this button once.

The button will not operate if:

- the detector is disabled through the GPI function; or
- the RESET / DISABLE button has been configured as "locked out". Refer to Section 5.5.13 on page 77 for further information.

2.4 Internal Buttons

AutoConfig

- To normalize the detector, press and hold the button until the AutoConfig LED illuminates continuously (approximately 2 seconds), then release the button.
- Cancel the Normalization function by pressing and holding the AutoConfig button for 5 seconds. The LED will turn off.

2.5 Communication Ports




Figure 2-3: Connection Method

The majority of user operations are performed using software installed on a computer connected to the detector via one of the physical communication ports or WiFi. The correct connection method to use depends on the purpose for connecting to the detector (Figure 2-3).

The physical communication ports are located on the main board inside the detector. It is necessary to open the front door in order access these ports. Refer to Section 7.2 for information on opening the front door.

USB

The USB port is used for configuration purposes ONLY. It allows direct connection between the VEA-040-A00 detector and a PC or laptop running the Xtralis VSC software.

Refer to Section 4.3.4 for information on connecting the USB lead, and Section 5.1.2 for information on creating connection profiles in Xtralis VSC.

Note: The USB port must not be used for permanent field connection. For example, do not use a USB to Ethernet or USB to Wifi adaptor to connect the detector to a LAN using USB.

Ethernet

The Ethernet port is used for configuration and/or monitoring purposes. It enables direct or routed network connection between the detector and a PC or laptop installed with Xtralis VSC.

Refer to Section 4.3.4 for information on connecting the Ethernet lead, and Section 5.1.2 for information on creating connection profiles in Xtralis VSC.

A password is required to access the detector via ethernet connection. It is initially set using Xtralis VSC during configuration with the USB port, and the user is required to enter it when creating an Ethernet connection profile in Xtralis VSC. It is also necessary to enter additional PIN codes to access administrative and distributor functions. Refer to Section 5.3 on page 48 for further information.

WIFI

The WiFi module provides wireless connection of the detector to the building network for the purpose of configuration and secondary monitoring with Xtralis VSC. The VEA-040-A00 is joined to a wireless network during initial configuration and remains connected while the access point is available.

Successful connection of the detector to the specified network is indicated by the WiFi LED inside the detector. The detector is then accessible using a device that is connected to the same access point that the detector is connected to, or a device that is joined to the same network as the access point that the detector is connected to.

A password is required to access the detector via WiFi connection. It is initially set using Xtralis VSC during configuration with the USB port, and the user is required to enter it when creating a WiFi connection profile in Xtralis VSC. It is also necessary to enter additional PIN codes to access administrative and distributor functions. Refer to Section 5.3 on page 48 for further information.

2.6 VESDAnet

A VESDAnet network allows:

- the VEA-040-A00 detector to report alarms and faults to a Fire Panel using a HLI (High Level Interface).
- configuration and monitoring of devices from a central computer.

Gateway function of the VEA-040-A00

The VEA-040-A00 detector also provides a gateway to the VESDAnet for a PC running Xtralis VSC connected to the VEA-040-A00 via Ethernet, USB or WiFi.

Refer to the VESDA Communications Guide for further information on VESDAnet network connectivity.







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3 Air Sampling Network

The VEA-040-A00 detector uses Microbore tubing to provide air sampling points.

For reliable smoke detection and flow monitoring performance, the detector must be connected to a balanced network comprised of between 6 and 40 equivalent length tubes.

3.1 Design Guidelines

Before You Start

To design an efficient tube network, you will need to:

- · Have knowledge of your local codes and standards.
- Undergo accreditation training in tube network design.
- Have access to a floor plan for the protected area. The floor plan must include details of existing or proposed fixtures, fittings and equipment.
- Have information about the purpose of the area to be protected.
- Determine the protection level required.

Design Process

To design an effective microbore network, it is suggested that the following steps are taken. The order in which these are completed may differ with each project.

- · Gather site information.
- Assign Tube Numbers and names for later entry into Xtralis VSC. Tubes must be consecutively used per their assigned number. Tube numbers are pre-allocated (1-40 for the detector).
- Plan and map the tube network in a CAD application. If necessary, use the VEA Microbore Tube Length Calculator (Document 29261) to determine tube lengths when varied length tubes are used.
- · Record the details of the optimum design.

3.1.1 Gather Site Information

As a first step it is essential to gather information about the site to be protected. For an existing site this may include a site survey prior to designing a microbore network. Most of the information required for an effective tube network design can be determined by a site visit. For sites yet to be constructed or where a site visit is not possible a site plan can be used to aid in design. The information required through a site survey includes:

- · Site layout and measurements
- Regulatory requirements
- · Air flow within the protected area
- The purpose for which the site is to be used
- Construction of the site (beams, beam pockets, and microbore tube obstructions)

3.1.2 Plan and Map the Sampling Network

Regulatory Requirements

Local codes and standards for aspirating smoke detectors will have precedence over any parameters suggested by Xtralis. Some of the key requirements are listed below.

- Maximum permissible transport time
- · Maximum area for a fire zone
- Area of coverage per sampling hole (this is usually same as a spot or point detector)
- · Maximum spacing between sampling points
- · Maximum area for aspirating systems
- Air changes per hour

Fire Zones and VESDA Addresses (Zones)

Fire zones are created to meet regulatory requirements, whereas, VESDA Addresses (also known as VESDA Zones) are used to associate detectors with remote devices. Each detector has a single VESDA zone number assigned to it during commissioning.

Planning the Network

In planning a sampling network, you must:

- Have an understanding of the area to be protected
- Identify any forced air ventilation and air flows (fans, air conditioners etc.)
- Take into account any customer specifications
- Determine if the design needs to address ceiling and under floor voids

The microbore tube network and sampling points are laid out using a CAD application and integrated into the construction drawings.

System Performance

System performance is mainly dependent upon transport time and alarm thresholds set on the detector.

Alarm thresholds can be configured using the Xtralis VSC software. Transport time is determined by the length of the microbore tubes used on the detector. There is no provision for the user to adjust the transport time and there is no tube modelling tool required for VEA.

The transport time is given in Table 3-1 for various tube lengths.

Recording Sampling Network Design Specifications

Keeping an accurate record of the sampling network design specifications assists the installation engineer to correctly configure the sampling network. This information is also useful to complete the commissioning form. Information that needs to be recorded includes:

- Site name and address
- Site measurements and layout
- Factors requiring special attention
- The number and location of VESDA addresses (zones)
- List of tube number and locations of respective sampling points
- Overlay showing the tube network layout with sampling hole positions
- Transport times
- Alarm thresholds

3.1.3 Tube Network Configuration

A VEA-040-A00 tube network requires between 6 and 40 Microbore tubes, each up to 100 meters (328 feet) in length.

All tubes must have equal airflow. This is achieved either by making them all equal in length, or adhering to specifications determined by the VEA Microbore Tube Length Calculator (Document 29261) for combinations of normal and reduced diameter tube configurations.

Note:

To allow for future repositioning of the sampling point, it is recommended that 2 to 3 m (6 to 10 ft) of tubing be coiled at the sampling point end . This can be achieved from the design stage where required length of coiling is added upfront at the design stage in the total tube length, so when the split length of normal and reduced diameter is calculated using the calculator, it is automatically factored into requirements.

Two types of Microbore tube can be used, as listed below in Table 3-2.

Table 3-2:	Microbore	Tube	Properties
------------	-----------	------	-------------------

Microbore Tube	Outer Diameter	Inner Diameter
Normal diameter	6 mm	4 mm
Reduced diameter	4 mm	2.5 mm

Note: Use metric sampling tubes. Imperial tubes will not fit correctly.




Figure 3-1: Configuration with equal length tubes

If equal tube lengths are used, then it is recommended that excess tubing be coiled close to the sampling point end (Figure 3-1).

Where the tube length calculator requires a tube to be comprised of a combination of normal and reduced diameter microbore tube, a reducer piece must be used between the two tubes (P/N VSP-1000).

A minimum of 0.1m (0.33ft) normal tube is required to connect the reduced diameter tube to the detector inlet port.




Figure 3-2: Configuration with mixed diameter tubes




Figure 3-3: Input numbering

Tube inlets are numbered as per Figure 3-3 below. Unused inlets on the detector should be blocked using blanking plugs (P/N VSP-998).

Caution: Do not insert ANY object into the inlet ports other than the normal diameter tube. This is to avoid damage to the fitting.

Ensure that Microbore tubes are never glued anywhere in the tube network, including to the inlets of the detector. Tubes can be joined using appropriate joiners.

Ensure that the tubes are fully inserted into the detector's tube inlets.

The provided tube cutter or a similar tool must be used to cut the tubes. Ensure that the tubes are cut so as to leave the end of the tube circular. Do not use tools such as side cutters which could squash the tube during cutting and leave the end of the tube oval shaped. If the end of the tube is oval shaped this could cause an air leak because the tube may be difficult to insert correctly. This could then cause airflow normalisation and sample point testing to fail.

The diagram below shows correctly cut and badly cut tube ends.




Figure 3-4: Correctly cut and badly cut tube ends

3.1.4 Managing the Exhaust Air




Figure 4-2: Smoke Test Ports (A) and Exhaust Port (B)

Air is expelled from the detector via the exhaust port on the left side of the unit enclosure. See Figure 4-2.

3.2 Installation Guidelines

These instructions are the basic sequence of steps you will be required to perform when installing the sampling network. The normal procedure for installation is:

- 1. Check the design documents to gather information on the tube network design specifications.
- 2. Mark the spot where the detector is to be installed.
- 3. Run the microbore tubing from the detector towards the sampling point, ensuring there are no kinks. Coil any excess tubing close to the sampling point end.
- 4. Mount the microbore tubing in the appropriate positions as specified by the design documents.
- 5. Check if the design documents require sampling end points and install as required.
- 6. If entry points are required to an enclosed area like a cabinet, drill an appropriate size hole in the cabinet top or use an existing cable entry port.
- 7. Install the detector. For further information refer to Chapter 4.
- 8. Insert the microbore tubing into the detector. Do not glue the tubes to the tube inlets.
- 9. Update the design documents with any changes that may have been made to the original plan.
- 10. Use appropriate labels and tag the microbore tubing and sampling holes.
- 11. Update the design documents with any further changes that may have been made during the tests, and give a copy of the updated design documents to the person commissioning the system.

3.2.1 Microbore Network Components

Microbore Tubing

Sampling is achieved through the Microbore flexible tubing with 6 mm (0.24 in) OD and 4mm (0.16 in) ID.

Sampling Points

There are two types of sampling points available, standard sampling points or surface mount sampling points. Standard sampling points are used where a ceiling void is available with microbore tubing laid out in the ceiling void. The surface mount sampling point is used on hard ceilings. Both types of sampling points are available for 6mm and 4mm tubes.

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4 Installation

The VEA-040-A00 detector is shipped with the following components:

- One VESDA-E VEA-040-A00 detector
- 1 Installation Sheet
- 1 Mounting bracket
- 1 Mounting template for direct mounting
- 1 End of Line resistor for the monitored GPI
- 1 Tube cutter (taped inside the detector door)

Check all components for damage and refer any concerns to your authorized representative.

Depending on the nature of the installation, it may be necessary to procure the following items:

- The latest revision of this full product guide can be downloaded from the partner extranet at www.xtralis.com.
- A 24 VDC Power Supply and backup battery, compliant with local fire protection codes and standards
- Screws and inserts that are appropriate for the installation location.
- Type A to Type B USB Interface Lead, required for initial configuration of the detector (Figure 4-1).
- Wrist strap for ESD prevention.

4.1 Prepare the Detector

4.1.1 Smoke Test Port Plugs

Ensure that the two smoke test port plugs (A) (Figure 4-2) are in place and fully inserted.

4.1.2 Exhaust port

Ensure that the exhaust port (B) (Figure 4-2) is open.

4.1.3 Wiring Inlets





Figure 4-3: Remove Cable and Conduit Inlet Plugs

Remove cable inlet plugs as required (Figure 4-3). Place a large screwdriver in the large slot and twist (A), or use a small screwdriver in the side slots (B) to lever the plug out. Use the edge of the detector (C) for a lever point to avoid marking the case.

4.2 Mounting

The VEA-040-A00 detector must be mounted in an upright position on a solid surface. Do not mount the detector with a sideways or inverted orientation.




Figure 4-4: Mounting location

Ensure that there is sufficient clearance to mount the detector (Figure 4-4), noting the location of air sampling tubes and cable entry points. Installation must provide for sufficient movement in all Microbore tubing and electrical conduit to allow easy fitment and removal.

4.2.1 Remove Transit Screws

Remove the two transit screws (A).





Figure 4-5: Remove transit screws

Note: The transit screws are used to hold the air pump during transit. If the screws are not removed excessive noise will be generated.

4.2.2 Mounting the Detector with the Mounting Bracket


1. Position the mounting bracket (A) to allow electrical conduit (B) to line up horizontally with the alignment marks (C) (Figure 4-6).




Figure 4-7: Mark keyholes

2. Mark the mounting surface through five recessed screw holes (D) on the mounting surface (Figure 4-7) and drill pilot holes.

- 3. Secure mounting bracket to mounting surface by tightening screws.




Figure 4-8: Mounting the detector

- 4. Align the four mounting studs (E) on the rear of the detector with the mounting stud slots on the mounting bracket, and slide the detector down until the top of the detector is flush with the top of the mounting bracket (Figure 4-8).




Figure 4-9: Locking Screw

- 5. Open the door on the front of the detector (Figure 4-9). Refer to Section 7.2 on page 82 for further information on how to open the door.
- 6. Remove the yellow tape covering the partially inserted locking screw (F).
- 7. Tighten the locking screw (F). This secures the detector to the mounting bracket.

4.2.3 Mounting the Detector using the Mounting Template




Figure 4-10: Position mounting template

- 1. Position the mounting template to allow electrical conduit (A) to line up with the alignment marks (B) (Figure 4-10):
- 2. Secure the mounting template to the wall.




Figure 4-11: Insert mounting screws

3. Insert two M4 button head screws at positions C and D such that the screw head is protruding 7 mm from the wall (Figure 4-11). Drill a pilot hole at position E for later insertion of a screw at Step 9.




Figure 4-12: Cut the electrical conduit

- 4. Position the electrical conduits (A) on the marked center lines (Figure 4-12).
- 5. Cut the conduits as required to a suitable depth.

- 6. Remove the mounting template.
- 7. In order to allow the detector to be positioned, retract the electrical conduits.




Figure 4-13: Mount the detector

- 8. Mount the detector onto the two screws (Figure 4-13).




Figure 4-14: Locking screw

9. Insert an M4 screw at the small end of the detector's bottom-left keyhole, and tighten the other two screws (Figure 4-14).

10. Insert the electrical conduit.

4.3 Wiring

The screw type terminals located on electrical terminals within the VEA-040-A00 detector will accept wire sizes from 0.2 mm² to 2.5 mm² (30 – 12 AWG). Use 1.1 mm² (18 AWG) or larger wire diameter for power connections.

Refer to Codes and Standards Information for Air Sampling Smoke Detection on page iii for code specific requirements.

Note: The VEA-040-A00 detector is IP 40 rated, therefore a suitable cable gland or conduit must be used

to maintain the IP rating. The IP rating is not UL tested.

Caution: Electrostatic discharge (ESD) precautions need to be taken prior to removing the fascia from

the detector in order to prevent damage to sensitive electronic components within the VEA-040-

A00.

4.3.1 Cabling Inlets

The VESDA-E VEA-040-A00 contains four inlets for power, relay and network cabling, located on the upper and lower sides of the detector base. The holes have a diameter of 26 mm (1.02 inch).

Note: To maintain the specified IP rating, cable glands or conduit must be used.




Figure 4-15: Cabling Inlets




Figure 4-16: Socket Locations

4.3.3 Power Source

Connect a 24 VDC power supply which is compliant with local fire protection codes and standards to the PWR IN socket.

The Relay StaX is powered from the EXP Power socket. Refer to Section 4.3.12 and Appendix A for further information on wiring the Relay StaX.

The detector will not operate if the power supply polarity is reversed.



Caution: Operating the detector when DC supply voltage is outside the specified voltage range may

cause damage to internal components. For further information refer to the Product

Specifications on page 9.

Compliance

It is recommended that the power supply be compliant with local codes and standards required by the regional authority. For code-specific information, refer to Codes and Standards Information for Air Sampling Smoke Detection on page iii.

4.3.4 Communication Ports

The front door must be opened in order to access the communication ports. Refer to Section 7.2 for information on opening the front door and Figure 4-16 for the physical location of the ports.

Note: For all connection methods the detector also provides a gateway to all the other devices on the VESDAnet network.

USB

The USB port is used for initial configuration and local maintenance or servicing of the VEA-040-A00 using a PC installed with Xtralis VSC software.

Install Xtralis VSC prior to connecting the VEA-040-A00 to the PC or Laptop. This ensures that the required USB drivers are present.

Notes:

- The USB port must not be used for permanent field connection. For example, do not use a USB to Ethernet or USB to Wifi adaptor to connect the detector to a LAN using USB.
- Refer to the Xtralis VSC documentation for operating system compatibility information.

Ethernet

The Ethernet port is used for permanent network connection to the VEA-040-A00. An Ethernet lead can be routed through the cable entry ports and plugged into the Ethernet port.

Use a standard Ethernet lead when connecting the VEA-040-A00 to a network switch, router or directly to a PC or laptop.

WiFi

The WiFi module provides wireless connection of the detector to the building network for the purpose of configuration and secondary monitoring.

4.3.5 VESDAnet

VESDAnet is a bidirectional data communication network between connected VESDA-E devices. VESDAnet connectivity is available on the VEA-040-A00 detector. Refer to Section 2.6 for further information.

It is recommended that RS 485 (Belden 9841 - 120 Ohm) twisted pair cables be used for including the devices in the network.

The network cables are terminated at the VESDAnet A and B Terminals. Cabling from one VESDA-E device is brought into the detector at one terminal and looped out to another device on VESDAnet from the other terminal.

Notes:

- The polarity of the data wires must be maintained throughout the network.
- In order for the detector to be able to detect ground faults on the VESDAnet wiring, the Ground Reference Terminal (Figure 4-16) must be connected to the local ground.




Figure 4-17: Example closed loop VESDAnet network

The VESDA-E VEA-040-A00 detector is shipped with the VESDAnet A and B terminals looped. Remove the A and B links prior to connecting the detector to the VESDAnet. If the detector is not to be networked with other devices, then do not remove the A and B links.




Figure 4-18: Closed loop for standalone detectors with VESDAnet capability

4.3.6 Relays

The relays, located on the main processor card, interface to the Fire Alarm Control Panel (FACP) to communicate faults, alarms and disabled states. The relays can be programmed using Xtralis VSC. Relays 3 and 6 are permanently set for Urgent Fault and Fire 1 respectively. Table 4-22 below illustrates the default assignments of functions (conditions) to relays and summarizes the default behavior of each relay. Section 5.5.10 describes how to configure the relay behavior using Xtralis VSC. It is possible to assign more than one condition to a relay.

Fire 1 Relay

If a detector relay is to be used to signal fire alarm to the Fire Alarm Control Panel (FACP) then the Fire 1 relay must be used.

Fault and Fire 1 Relay Terminals

The Urgent and Minor Fault relays are energized during normal operation while the Fire 1 relay is only energized when a Fire 1 is detected. The operation of the relays is summarized in the following table.




Table 4-1: Typical Relay Operation

4.3.7 Unmonitored General Purpose Input (GPI)

The Unmonitored GPI is a programmable input which can be configured to initiate a number of different actions, including, by default, a Remote Reset function. Refer to Section 5.5.9 on page 71 for further information.

A voltage input of between 5V and 30V signals GPI ON. Less than 2V signals GPI OFF. The input is isolated from the system by an opto-coupler device.

4.3.8 Monitored General Purpose Input (GPI) Wiring

The monitored GPI senses contact closure and is configurable to initiate the same actions as the unmonitored GPI. "Remote Reset" is the default setting. A closed contact signals GPI ON and open contact signals GPI OFF. Refer to Section 5.5.9 on page 71 for further information.

A 10K end of line resistor is used to allow the detector to monitor for open circuit faults in the wiring from the detector to the contact. Refer to Section 4.3.11 for information on correct wiring of the End of Line resistor.

4.3.9 Typical Wiring to Fire Alarm Control Panel (FACP)

The diagram below shows the correct way to wire VESDA-E detectors to a conventional fire alarm control panel (FACP).




Figure 4-19: Typical wiring to a fire panel with EOL

4.3.10 Typical Wiring to Addressable Loop Module

This wiring example is for wiring VESDA-E detectors to a typical third party Input/Output Loop module 3 inputs 1 output.

Note: These are example drawings. Refer to the appropriate product manual for the exact wiring details of the third party equipment.




Figure 4-20: Input/Output Loop Module with EOL

Note:

UL Listed addressable input modules can be connected to the VEA-040-A00 detector alarm relays, as shown in Figure 4-20, for primary reporting of a fire alarm. The relay outputs of the Relay StaX Module, as described in Appendix A.1, provide secondary address information, identifying which tubes of the associated detector generated the alarm condition. UL listed addressable input modules can be connected to the relay outputs of the Relay StaX Module as shown in Figure A-17 on page 115.

4.3.11 Typical Wiring for Monitored GPI for PSU Monitoring

The diagram below shows the correct way to configure power supply monitoring. It also shows where an End Of Line (EOL) resistor is correctly installed. Refer to Section 4.3.10 on page 36 for further information.




Figure 4-21: Power Supply Connection Diagram

4.3.12 System Wiring

A single VEA detector can support communications with single Local Relay StaX module. There are limitations for powering multiple units with a single power supply. The following connectivity guidelines must be adhered to:

Power

Connect from the EXP PWR connector in the detector to the PWR IN connector in the Local Relay StaX. Use 1.1 mm² (18 AWG) or larger wire diameter for power connections.

Data

Connect from the DATA connector in the detector to any DATA connector in the Relay StaX unit.

Example




Figure 4-22: Single VEA detector and Local Relay StaX

• Detector with Local Relay StaX (Figure 4-22)

Note: Refer to Appendix A for additional wiring information for the Local Relay StaX module.

4.3.13 Specify Backup Battery

In the event of a mains power supply disruption, the VEA-040-A00 detector runs on a backup battery located in the external power supply (the power supply must be compliant with local fire protection codes and standards). The size of the battery is determined by:

- · local codes and standards
- the total power required by the system
- · back up time required
- · allowance for reduction in capacity with age
- · expected temperature variations

Note: It is recommended that batteries be inspected and changed as per manufacturer's specifications or as per local codes and standards.

To facilitate the calculation of the backup battery size, refer to the VEA Battery Calculator (Document 21062), available from Xtralis Partner Extranet (www.xtralis.com).

4.4 Powering Up

After installing the detector it is necessary to power up the system. The detector initializes and performs self-testing for approximately 5 minutes.

The VEA-040-A00 detector does not have a power switch i.e it is an "always on" device which is activated by applying powered cabling to the power input terminal on the main board (Figure 4-16). This process must only be performed by Xtralis accredited personnel.

If the system fails to power up, check all power wires are secured to their terminals and that the polarity is correct. Ensure that the power supply voltage is in the required range, as indicated in Section 2.7.

On power up:

- The Power LED illuminates and the detector runs a series of self-diagnostic tests.
- If there is a fault, the Fault LED illuminates. To identify the fault, check the Active Event List for the detector using Xtralis VSC or iVESDA.
- The pump starts up and air may be felt flowing out of the exhaust port.

It is normal for the detector to display airflow faults immediately after the first power up and until the air flow normalization step is done. After normalization is completed, reset the detector by pressing the reset button on the front of the unit. This will unlatch the relays and turn off the Fault LED. Any remaining faults will cause the Fault LED to illuminate again. Proceed with the preliminary system check.

It is necessary to wait 5 minutes after power up before Normalization can be performed.

The detector will scan the 40 tubes for flow faults when Reset is performed. This flow scan can be canceled using the Stop Flow Scan command in Xtralis VSC. Refer to Section 5.4 for further information.

4.6 Preliminary System Check

A preliminary system check is required after installing the VEA-040-A00 detector, before it is commissioned for use.

To perform the preliminary system check:

- Power up the detector by connecting the power supply to the Power In terminal.
- Check that the display is functioning.
- Check that the pump is functioning by determining whether air is being expelled from the exhaust port.

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5 Configuration

This chapter describes a number of configuration options, user functions and security features of the VEA-040-A00 detector that the installer and users must be familiar with. These include:

- · defining connections and connecting to the detector
- security
- · detector commands
- · configuration options
- relay options
- GPI functions
- · default settings

The VEA-040-A00 detector is initially configured using Xtralis VSC software installed on a PC directly connected to the USB port. It is necessary to connect to the detector in order to configure it. The procedures for defining connections is described in Section 5.1.1 below.

5.1 Communication between Xtralis VSC and the detector

In order to allow communication between Xtralis VSC and the detector, the following steps must be performed:

- 1. Define a USB Connection Profile and then connect to the detector. (See Sections 5.1.1, 5.1.2 and "Adding a USB Connection" below).
- 2. If using Ethernet or WiFi as a permanent connection method, then:
 - configure the respective parameters in the detector, including the authentication password.
 - create a connection profile for Ethernet or WiFi as required.
 - · Connect to the detector.

USB is used for initial configuration, however it must not be used for permanent connection. Permanent connection for secondary monitoring must only be done with Ethernet or WiFi.

For example, the installer would connect directly to a VEA-040-A00 using the USB port with a laptop running Xtralis VSC in order to configure the detector to enable Ethernet or WiFi, the parameters of which could be unique for each installation. A connection profile would need to be defined for the temporary USB connection, and then for the permanent connection using VESDAnet, Ethernet or WiFi.

Note: Refer to the VESDA Communications Guide for further information.

5.1.1 Defining Connection Profiles in Xtralis VSC

There are multiple ways to connect to a VEA-040-A00 detector. Each connection method requires a range of information. This information is saved in a connection profile in the Xtralis VSC Connection Manager, which subsequently enables the user to quickly connect to the detector.

5.1.2 Connection Profile for a Detector

To define a connection to a VEA-040-A00 detector connected to the PC or laptop via USB, Ethernet or WiFi, follow this procedure:




Figure 5-1: Connection Manager

1. In Xtralis VSC, select **Connection | Manager** from the menu system. The Connection Manager dialog is displayed (Figure 5-1).

2. Select Add.




Figure 5-2: Add Connection

The Add Connection dialog is displayed (Figure 5-2).

3. Select the VESDAnet connection option, then select Next.

Adding a USB Connection




Figure 5-3: Select USB

1. Select **USB**, then select **Next** (Figure 5-3).




Figure 5-4: Enter a Connection Name

2. Enter a unique name for the Connection or accept the pre-generated name, then select **Finish** (Figure 5-4).

Adding an Ethernet or WiFi connection




Figure 5-5: Select Ethernet

1. Select Ethernet / WiFi, then select Next (Figure 5-5).




Figure 5-6: Enter IP Address

2. Enter the IP address of the detector. Enter the password that has been set for Ethernet and WiFi authentication. Select **Next** (Figure 5-6).

Note: The IP address and password of the detector is configured in the Ethernet or WiFi options section during initial setup with a USB connection. Refer to Section 5.5.3 on page 65 or 5.5.4 on page 66 for further information.




Figure 5-7: Enter a Connection Name

3. Enter a unique name for the Connection or accept the pre-generated name, then select **Finish** (Figure 5-7).

5.2 Connecting to the Detector

Once a Connection Profile has been defined, it is possible to connect to the VEA-040-A00 detector using the following methods:

5.2.1 Connecting to a detector via USB

Direct connection between the detector and the PC installed with Xtralis VSC can be made using a Type A to Type B USB interface lead.




Figure 5-8: Connecting to a detector via USB

Connect to a detector using Xtralis VSC

- 1. If required, define a connection, as described in Section 5.1.2 on page 41.
- 2. Select Connection > Connect and View.
- 3. If the previously defined connection profile is set as the default connection, select OK, otherwise select Details, then select the required USB connection from the list of available connection profiles and select OK.

5.2.2 Connecting to a detector via Ethernet




Figure 5-9: Connecting to a detector via Ethernet using a router or switch

Connection using Ethernet cabling between the detector and the PC installed with Xtralis VSC can be made using a router or switch (Figure 5-9), or directly between the two devices. Complex networks are beyond the scope of this document.

For a successful connection, Ethernet connectivity must be enabled within the detector, the detector must have an IP address, and an authentication password must be set. Configuration procedures for these requirements are detailed below.

Enabling Ethernet Connection

The Ethernet connection method only needs be configured once, and then edited if there is a change to any of the relevant building network connection parameters.

- 1. Physically connect the detector to the building network.
- 2. Configure the detector to use Ethernet.

- Connect to the detector using USB following the procedure described in Section 5.2.1.
- In the Ethernet tab for the detector:
 - For dynamic IP addresses, set Automatically obtain IP Address to on. Once it has been successfully allocated, record the IP Address for use in connection profiles. It can be found on the detector status screen.
 - For static IP addresses, set Automatically obtain IP Address to off and set the IP Address,
 Subnet Mask and Default Gateway to a valid address in the building network.
 - Set the detector authentication password. Refer to Section 5.3.1 on page 48 for further information.

Connect to a detector using Xtralis VSC

- 1. Using the normal building network connection process, connect the PC to the network.
- 2. Add an Ethernet / WiFi connection using Connection Manager in Xtralis VSC. Refer to Section 5.1.2 for further information.
- 3. Enter the IP address of the detector previously set when enabling Ethernet connections. Where the IP address is not known, it may be viewed on the detector status screen using a USB connection.
- 4. Enter the Authentication Password previously set when enabling Ethernet connections.
- 5. Select Connection > Connect and View.
- 6. If the previously defined connection profile is set as the default connection, select OK, otherwise select Details, then select the required Ethernet connection from the list of available connection profiles and select OK.

5.2.3 Connecting to a detector via WiFi




Figure 5-10: Connecting to a detector via WiFi using a router

Connection using WiFi between the detector and the PC installed with Xtralis VSC can be made using a router or access point (Figure 5-10). The example below shows both devices joined to the same wireless network. Complex networks are beyond the scope of this document.

Enabling WiFi Connection

The WiFi connection method only needs be configured once, and then edited if there is a change to any of the relevant building network connection parameters.

- 1. Connect to the detector using USB following the procedure described in Section 5.2.1.
- 2. In the WiFi tab for the detector:
 - For dynamic IP addresses, set **Automatically obtain IP Address** to on. Once it has been successfully allocated, record the IP Address for use in connection profiles. It can be found on the detector status screen.
 - For static IP addresses, set **Automatically obtain IP Address** to off, and set the the **IP Address**, **Subnet Mask** and **Default Gateway** to a valid address in the building network.
 - Set the SSID, security mode and WEP key or WPA pass phrase as required to connect to the building access point. Refer to Section 5.5.4 for further information.
 - Set the detector authentication password, using the Set Password button located in the General tab. Refer to Section 5.3.1 on page 48 for further information.

Connect to a detector using Xtralis VSC

1. Using the normal building network connection process, configure the PC to connect to the WiFi access point.

- 2. Add a Ethernet / WiFi connection profile using Connection Manager in Xtralis VSC. Refer to Section 5.1.2 for further information.
- 3. Enter the IP address of the detector previously set when enabling WiFi connections. Where the IP address is not known, it may be viewed on the detector status screen using a USB connection.
- 4. Enter the Authentication Password previously set when enabling WiFi connections.
- 5. Select Connection > Connect and View.
- 6. If the previously defined connection profile is set as the default connection, select OK, otherwise select Details, then select the required WiFi connection from the list of available connection profiles and select OK.

5.2.4 Connection to a detector via VESDAnet

A VEA-040-A00 that is part of a VESDAnet network can be accessed via another VESDA-E device acting as a gateway:

- the VEA-040-A00 must be physically connected to the VESDAnet, as described in Section 4.3.5.
- another VESDA-E detector can be used as a gateway to communicate between the PC with Xtralis VSC and any device connected to the VESDAnet.




Figure 5-11: Connection to a detector via another detector on VESDAnet using a WiFi connection

Alternatively it is possible to connect using a High Level Interface (HLI) connected between the PC or Laptop with Xtralis VSC and the VESDAnet Socket in one of the devices on the VESDAnet.

Notes:

- The VEA-040-A00 detector acts as a gateway on VESDAnet and allows a PC connected to the Ethernet, USB or WiFi connections to communicate with the gateway VEA-040-A00 itself and any other device on VESDAnet.
- Refer to the VESDA Communications Guide for detailed information on VESDAnet.

Define a new Connection Profile (USB, Ethernet or WiFi connection between the PC and the detector which is acting as a gateway)

1. For VESDA-E detectors, follow the steps in Section 5.1.2 and add a USB, Ethernet or WiFi connection.

Access the VEA-040-A00

1. Connect to the gateway device in Xtralis VSC using Connection Manager. The software then automatically polls the VESDAnet for devices and lists them in the VESDAnet device list.

5.3 Security

The VEA-040-A00 has two levels of protection against unauthorized access. For connection via Ethernet or WiFi, a password of at least 8 characters must be used. After connection, a four digit PIN is used to control the access level.

5.3.1 WiFi and Ethernet Authentication

A password is used to authenticate access over Ethernet or WiFi connection when using Xtralis VSC or iVESDA.

The password is set in the General options tab for the VEA-040-A00 detector, and applies to both Ethernet and WiFi access. Refer to Section 5.5.3 on page 65 and Section 5.5.4 on page 66 for further information. When creating connection profiles in Xtralis VSC or iVESDA, the same password must be entered. Refer to Section 5.1.2 on page 41 for further information.

The password must conform to the following rules:

- 8 or more characters.
- Contains one or more numeric characters.
- Contains both upper case and lower case characters.

5.3.2 Access Control

When accessing the VEA-040-A00 detector via Xtralis VSC or iVESDA, user functionality is initially limited. For additional privileges, the user must log in to the detector using an 4 digit numeric PIN code. In Xtralis VSC, select Logon from the Connection menu and enter the PIN.

The default PIN for each level of user is set at the factory. The distributor has access to the PINs for each level. PIN numbers are disclosed to authorized personnel attending accredited training courses.

After logging in the user has the option to change the default PIN. To guard against unauthorized access, if someone enters an incorrect PIN number three times they will not be allowed another attempt for ten minutes.

5.4 Commands

The following commands are able to be issued to the detector. As indicated below in Table 5-2, a small number of basic commands can be executed from the detector via buttons, while the full range of commands can be executed using the Xtralis VSC or iVESDA software.

5.4.1 Air Flow Set Up

Initial Flow Scan

Once the system is set up, check that the air sampling tubes are correctly inserted into the detector and that unused air sampling ports are securely blocked with blanking plugs.

Execute a flow scan as described in Table 5.4, 'Start Flow Scan' which may take up to 30 minutes to complete. When complete, check the EVENT LOG for tube flow results. Flows should be in the range 0.3 to 0.9 l/m.

Notes:

- Ports with blanking plugs (i.e. not used) should have very little flow so they should read less than 0.1 l/m.
- Ports that have tubes connected should have flows in the range 0.3 to 0.9 l/m. If flows are outside this range check for tube blockages or connection air leaks.


Debugging Flow

If there are problems with a port or tube which have been identified and fixed, check that they are operating in the required flow range by performing 'Tube Flow Scan' as shown in Table 5.4. This allows selection and checking of a small number of tubes to save time.

Normalise

Once all tube flows are within the expected range, execute a flow normalise command, 'Start Normalize Air Flow' as shown in Table 5.4.

This will take up to 30 minutes to complete. When complete, the following table will appear on the Xtralis VSC screen.



This shows the flow through all ports of the detector at the completion of normalization. The table above highlights the highest and lowest flows in each of the two detection channels. The ratio of the lowest to highest value should be no more than 0.6.

The 'Report' button will produce a text file showing all the normalization results which may be saved and printed as evidence of successful commissioning.

5.4.2 Walk Test Command

The Walk Test function allows the user to quickly perform a smoke test for a selected series of tubes.

Using Walk Test to perform a smoke test on a number of tubes is faster than using the detector's normal operating mode. This is because in Walk Test the detector moves the rotary valve to the tube to be tested and waits for the user to generate smoke. In the normal operating mode the detector first detects smoke with the rotary valve in the position in which air is supplied from all tubes. The system then scans to find which tube has smoke.

The Walk test function is controlled by Xtralis VSC. The user can set up the order of tubes to walk test in Xtralis VSC, save this list to the detector configuration and print the list to a text file (for reference while doing the Walk Test).

The detector signals Walk Test status in real time on Xtralis VSC and to the Fire Alarm Control Panel using the Fire 1 relay, a relay configured for Walk Test (if configured, refer to Section 5.5.10 on page 74 for further information) and the appropriate VER-A40-40-STX module relays if connected.

The detector generates fault 831 while the Walk Test function is active. The detector automatically drops out of Walk Test mode after a configurable period of no smoke activity.

The user can stop/start Walk Test midway through the Walk Test sequence. Also the user can start the Walk Test at a chosen tube.

The system generates a report using Xtralis VSC showing which tubes were tested. The report shows the time of the test and the pass status for each tube. The order of the report is the order of testing of tubes.

The user can disconnect Xtralis VSC while the Walk Test is being run and re-display the Walk Test status when they re-connect.

Walk test requires firmware version 5.30 or higher.

Start Walk Test

Before starting Walk Test first configure the set of tubes to be tested. See Section 5.5.12 on page 76 for further information.

To start the Walk Test, select the Walk Test command using the Device menu.

Walk Test does not start if:

- Airflow Normalisation, Flow Scan or Sampling Point Cleaning is in operation.
- The detector has an Alert or higher alarm level.
- · Local Smoke Test is running.


The following screen will appear. This screen shows the Walk Test Status. Select the **Start** button at bottom left to start the Walk Test.



The detector will then update the Walk Test Status screen to state that the Walk Test is active and will also show the current tube being tested. This example shows the current tube as "Tube 002".



The Xtralis VSC Detail status screen can also be used to see the Walk Test status. This example shows tube 2 being tested.



Generate smoke for the current tube.

The detector will then do the following:

- The system will briefly show an alarm event on the VSC Active Event List.
- The relay configured to signal Walk Test will be turned on.
- The Walk Test Status screen will show the next tube to be tested.

Stop Walk Test

Walk test will stop when either:

- All holes have been tested.
- Stop is selected through the Walk Test Status screen.
- No smoke is supplied to the selected tube for more than the "Default Timeout" period.

Checking The Walk Test

You can use the Walk Test report or the detector's Event log to determine that each tube has been tested.

Generate Walk Test Report


To generate a report showing which tubes were successfully tested, click the **Report** button on the Walk Test Status screen. (The report feature is only available after Walk test is stopped.)

A report will be generated in a text file. See example below:

Notes

The Walk Test Status screen can be closed and then re-opened via the Device menu at any time during Walk test without affecting the progress of the Walk Test.

5.5 Configuration Options

The VEA detector can be configured using the Xtralis VSC software.

The following sections describe the configuration options available in Xtralis VSC.

5.5.1 General Options

General options include some basic identification information for the detector.




Figure 5-15: General Options

The General configuration options are as follows:

- Network Name: The name of the VESDAnet network. (The user can leave this blank if desired.).
- Location: A description of the physical location of the detector. This name will appear on Xtralis VSC and on the LCD display of the A10 model detector.
- Serial Number: The serial number of the device. This is factory set and cannot be changed.
- **VESDA Zone**: The unique zone number used to link this detector and remote display/relay devices or remote relay which output alarm and trouble status for this detector to the Fire Alarm Control Panel.

Authentication

• **Change Password:** Set the password used to authenticate Ethernet and WiFi access. Refer to Section 5.3.1 on page 48 for further information.

5.5.2 VESDAnet Options

VESDAnet options provide the ability to control network data transmission behaviour for VESDAnet connections.




Figure 5-16: VESDAnet Communications Options

The Communications configuration options are as follows:

- **Preferred Port:** The preferred VESDAnet port to be used to transmit network data from this device. The non-preferred port is used if for some reason transmissions on the preferred port fail. For best performance in large networks, this setting should be randomly distributed between connected devices.
- Loop Open Ended on This Device: This should be checked if the network has been wired so either VESDAnet port A or VESDAnet B is not connected on this detector. (Xtralis recommends that VESDAnet ports A and B are always connected so this option should normally not be checked.).
- **Status Update Interval:** The minimum time interval between status events for the selected detector within its zone.

5.5.3 Ethernet Options

The Ethernet options provide the ability to configure the detector to join an existing wired Ethernet network using the normal building network connection process or be directly connected to a PC or laptop.




Figure 5-17: Ethernet Options

The Ethernet configuration options are as follows:

Dynamic IP Address Configuration

Automatically obtain IP Address: Controls whether the VEA-040-A00 uses a static IP address or
automatically obtains an address from a DHCP server available on the building network. If this option is
selected, the IP address, Subnet Mask and Default Gateway fields are disabled. Once the IP address
has been successfully obtained by the detector, it is displayed on the detector detail status screen.

Static IP Address Configuration

- IP Address: IPV4 static address. This address must be used when creating a connection profile for the detector in Xtralis VSC.
 - The default IP address is 192.168.0.200. This allows direct connection between a PC or Laptop and the VEA-040-A00 using a standard Ethernet lead.
 - Prior to connecting the detector to a router or other gateway device, the default address must be changed to an address in the range used by the router. This can be done by connecting to the detector using the USB port.
- Subnet Mask: The subnet mask for the network.
- Default Gateway: The IP address of the router or other gateway device that is servicing the network.

5.5.4 WiFi Options

The WiFi options provide the ability to configure the detector to join an existing WiFi network using the normal building network connection process.

After the WiFi parameters have been entered and the user selects Apply or OK, the detector will connect to the access point and remain connected while the access point is available. The WiFi LED inside the detector is continuously lit while the detector is connected to the access point, and is turned off if the detector is not connected to the access point.




Figure 5-18: WiFi options

WiFi Network Connection Parameters

The following parameters are required to join the detector with an existing WiFi network:

- WiFi Enabled: Controls whether detector attempts to use WiFi and connect to an access point.
- Access Point SSID: Set by installer to suit building access point.
- Security mode: Set by installer to suit building access point
- Key: WPA or WEP Key required to join the VEA-040-A00 to the building network. This field is disabled if the Security Mode is set to Open.

WiFi IP Configuration Parameters

The following parameters allow setting of a dynamic or static IP address for the VEA-040-A00 on the WiFi network:

Dynamic IP Address Configuration

Automatically obtain IP Address: Controls whether the VEA-040-A00 uses a static IP address or
automatically obtains an address from a DHCP server. If this option is selected, the IP address, Subnet
Mask and Default Gateway fields are disabled. When the detector is joined to the network, the IP
address that has been allocated to the detector by the DHCP server can be viewed on the detector
status screen in Xtralis VSC or iVESDA by using a USB connection.

Static IP Address Configuration

- IP Address: IPV4 static address
- Subnet Mask: Subnet mask for static address
- Default Gateway: Gateway for static address

5.5.5 Module Options

The module options screen provides the mechanism to configure:

- optional Local Relay StaX expected to be connected to the detector
- the number of tubes in use
- the tube length
- · the use of sampling points

Warning: Expansion Stax are not supported on VEA.

The options are as follows:

- **Approvals:** Set to "EN54-20" if the detector is installed on a site subject to EN54-20 approval. Set to "UL" if the detector is installed on a site subject to UL approval.
- Type: Always use "Not Installed".
- **Number of Tubes:** Set to configure the number of tubes connected to the detector. Note that the detector will generate a fault if the number of tubes configured does not equal the actual number of tubes detected when an airflow scan is performed.
- **Relay:** Tick to indicate that a Local Relay StaX is to be used with the detector, do not tick for the Expansion StaX.
- Tube Length: The length of each tube.
- Sampling Point: Tick if VEA sampling points are connected to each tube.

5.5.6 Smoke Threshold Options

Smoke Threshold options provide the mechanism to set the smoke obscuration trigger point for each alarm level, and the ability to assign day or night thresholds to cater for different levels of activity in the protected area during these times.




Figure 5-20: Smoke Threshold Options

The Smoke Threshold configuration options are as follows:

- Alarm Levels: The settings smoke thresholds. Day and Night periods are defined below in the Changeover settings.
 - Sensitivity: Select from Standard, Enhanced or High depending on the detection requirements. They respectively correspond to Standard Fire Detection (SFD) / Class C, Early Warning Fire Detection (EWFD) / Class B or EWFD / Class A. VEA operation in Class A environment requires other considerations. The threshold and the delay are used together to decide when to trigger the alarm condition.
 - Alert Threshold: Sets the Alert threshold as a ratio of the Fire 1 Threshold. The Action Threshold will be set midway between Alert and Fire 1.
- Delay: The length of time between the alarm threshold being reached and the relay operation.
- Changeover:
 - Work Days: Select which days use both day and night thresholds. Night time thresholds are used if
 a day is not selected.
 - Day / Night Changeover Time: The settings for the timing of the threshold changeover.
 - Holidays: The settings used to define a holiday period. Use the dropdown calendars to choose the start and end times of the holiday (or break) period. Night time thresholds are used during the holiday period.

5.5.7 Airflow Options

Airflow options provide the ability to set:

- limits for what the detector considers to be normal airflow behavior for the sampling network
- pump speed




Figure 5-21: Airflow Options

The Airflow Fault configuration options are as follows:

- Fault Sensitivity: The settings for air flow fault thresholds. Select from Narrow, Normal, Wide. The Narrow setting makes the detector the most sensitive to airflow reduction or increase due to faults in the tubing and the Wide setting the least sensitive. The threshold and the delay are used together to decide when to trigger the air flow fault condition.
- Flow Fault Delay: Select the air flow fault delay.

The Periodic Air Flow Testing configuration options are as follows:

- **Time of day of flow scan:** Sets the time of day for the scan of all tubes for air flow changes due to faults in the tubing. The process is called a Flow Scan.
- Flow scan: Sets how often the Flow Scan is performed.
- Sampling point test: Sets how often a sampling point test is done along with the Flow Scan. The user
 has the options: Disabled (i.e. no sampling point test is done), Every Flow Scan or Every Second Flow
 Scan.
- Tube cleaning: Sets how often tube cleaning is done along with the Flow Scan. The options are:
 - Disabled
 - Every 7th Flow scan through to every 35th Flow Scan.

5.5.8 Tube Configuration Options

Tube Name options provide the ability to enter area names for where the sampling points are located, and the sensitivity of each tube.

Tube numbers are pre-allocated - 1-40 for the detector.




Figure 5-22: Tube Name Options

The Tube configuration options are as follows:

- **Tube Name:** The name of each tube. This name is displayed when an alarm occurs and the system has found smoke present for that tube.
- **Group Factor:** The sensitivity of a tube. The group factor should be set equal to the number of odd (or even) numbered sampling points sampling from a particular space. For example, if Tubes 2 and 4 were sampling from the same space, then Group Factor should be set to two for tubes 2 and 4. If tubes 5, 7 and 9 were sampling from a particular space then Group Factor would be set to 3 for tubes 5, 7 and 9. However, if tubes 1 and 2 were sampling from a particular space then group factor would be set to 1.

5.5.9 General Purpose Inputs Options

The General Purpose Inputs options page provides the ability to control the behavior of the Unmonitored and Monitored General Purpose Inputs (GPIs).

The GPIs can be configured to initiate a number of different actions.




Figure 5-23: General Purpose Input Options



5.5.10 Relay Options

The Relay options page provides the ability to determine which alarm or fault condition is assigned to each relay and whether each condition is latched. In addition, each relay can be configured Normally Energized or Normally De-Energized.




Figure 5-24: Relay Options

Relay Assignments: Select the conditions you want to assign to each relay by checking the checkbox(es) under the relay. The blue coloured checkboxes cannot be changed; e.g. Relay 6 will always respond to the Fire 1 condition. You can assign more than one condition to a relay.

Normally Energized: The Normally Energized or Normally De-Energized setting of each relay can be configured using the checkbox in the Normally Energized row:

- If checked the relay is set Normally Energized.
- If unchecked the relay is set Normally De-energized.

In the Normally De-energized mode no drive is applied to the relay coil until the assigned condition such as Alert or Fire 1 occurs. The Normally Energized mode is the opposite. Drive is removed from the relay coil when the condition occurs.

The default mode of the relays is listed in Table 4-2.

Latching: If the cause of a condition is removed (for example, smoke decreases below the threshold) and latching is enabled, the detector "remembers" the condition and holds the corresponding relays and displays in the active state as though the cause of the condition were still active.

Latching can be enabled for any alarm condition or for urgent or minor fault by checking the corresponding latching checkbox to the right of the condition.

Configuration of latching for individual alarm or fault conditions requires firmware version 5.30 or higher.

5.5.11 Logging Options

The Logging options page allows the user to configure the detector's event logging and also the reporting of smoke status on VESDAnet remotely on Xtralis VSC or iVESDA.




Figure 5-25: Logging Options

Logging options are as follows:

Event Logging

- **Smoke Level Logging:** Set the level of smoke level logging in the detector's event log. The recommended setting is Normal unless more detailed logging is required to investigate a site issue.
- **Flow logging:** Set the level of air flow logging in the detector's event log. The recommended setting is Normal unless more detailed logging is required to investigate a site issue.

Smoke Level Reporting - VESDAnet:

• **Reporting:** Set the level of smoke level reporting on VESDAnet to Xtralis VSC or iVESDA. The recommended setting is Normal.

5.5.12 Walk Test Options


The Walk Test options page provides the ability to configure the Walk Test function. To run a Walk test, refer to Section 5.4.2 on page 59.

Before running walk test the user must first configure the tubes to be tested and the order of testing. This configuration is then saved to the detector memory and the Walk test can be re-run later with the same set of tubes and order of tubes.

Use the -- >> and <<-- buttons to move all tubes between the Available Tubes list and the Selected Tubes list. Use the -> and <- buttons to move individual tubes between the Available Tubes list and the Selected Tubes list.

Change the order of testing of tubes using the Up and Down buttons to the right of the Selected Tubes list.

This example shows that tubes 2,4,6, and 8 will be tested in that order:



Other parameters:

Alarm Delay: The Alarm Delay is the time period for which the smoke level must be above the Fire 1 threshold before the detector recognises that the Walk Test Alarm has occurred for that tube.

Relay Activation Duration: The Relay Activation Duration is the time period in seconds for which the relay configured for Walk Test will turn on when the Walk Test Alarm occurs.

Default Timeout: The default timeout is the time period in hours and minutes after which the Walk Test ends if no Walk Test alarm occurs for the current tube being tested.

Print test order: The user can generate a list giving the order of tubes to be tested by clicking the **Print** button. For example:

5.5.13 Button Lockout Options

The Button Lockout options page enables the user to configure the functionality of the detector's front panel button.




Figure 5-26: Button Lockout Options

To prevent execution of the Reset and Disable functions from the detector front panel button, check the checkbox for that function.

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6 Commissioning

Please see the VESDA VEA commissioning guide, document 32407, for instructions on how to commission a VEA system.

6.1 Hand Over

Hand over of the system occurs once you and the customer are satisfied that all aspects of commissioning the system have been addressed and meet the required standards. The system must be ready for day to day operation prior to hand over. To hand over the system to the client, you should:

- Ensure that the VESDA-E commissioning forms are complete and all relevant sections have been filled in
- If you have used Xtralis VSC, select the Device or Address then select **File | Print** to print out a copy of configuration details and include a copy with the hand over documents.
- Obtain the relevant signatures.
- Ensure that relevant attachments have been included with the commissioning form.
- Make copies of the completed commissioning forms and attachments and forward these to:
 - Appropriate Xtralis Sales Office
 - Installing contractor
 - · Designer of the system
 - End user of the system

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7 Maintenance

The VEA system employs centralized automated testing and maintenance during its normal operation. This ensures that end-to-end system integrity is maintained, including the detector, tubes and sampling points.

Preventative maintenance is not required. During routine site maintenance, ensure that there are no faults present and conduct a centralized smoke test.

Notes:

- Maintenance can be conducted by the original Xtralis authorized installer or an Xtralis authorized distributor or service contractor.
- The required frequency of maintenance checks may vary depending upon local codes and standards and the environment of the installation.



Caution:

While the detector or zone is disabled, no fire warnings will be annunciated by the detector. Prior to any maintenance or testing:

- Inform appropriate supervising authority about the risk associated with disabling a detector or zone.
- Check to see if the detector is also being used by a third party.
- Ensure that any ancillary devices dependent on the detector are isolated before work commences.

7.1 Standby

When maintenance is performed on the tube network or sampling points it is recommended that you temporarily set the detector to Standby in order to turn off the aspirator. Setting the VEA-040-A00 to Standby mode deactivates the aspirator and stops all detection of alarms (but not detection and signaling of faults). Standby mode is signaled on relay #1 and relay #3 by default. Other relays may also be configured to signal standby mode. Refer to sections 4.3.6 and 5.5.10 for further information. For example, standby mode may be also signaled as an additional condition on the Fault Relay (Relay #3).

To set the detector to Standby mode using Xtralis VSC, select Go to Standby from the Device menu. The Disabled LED will blink and the aspirator will turn off.

To re-activate the unit, select End Standby from the Device menu.

Standby requires firmware version 5.30 or higher.

7.2 Opening the Door

Several maintenance functions require that front door be opened.

Open the Front Door

- 1. Insert an Allen key (preferred), Philips head screwdriver or flat blade screwdriver with the blade vertically oriented into the hole at bottom left and press firmly.
- 2. Pull the door open.




Figure 7-1: Open the door

7.3 Removing the Fascia

Several maintenance functions require that the fascia be removed from the VEA-040-A00 detector in order to perform them.




Figure 7-2: Wrist Strap application




Figure 7-3: Fascia removal - remove screws




Figure 7-4: Disconnect the LCD and LED looms

7.4 Replacing the Filter

To maintain the operational integrity of the detector, it is recommended that the filter be replaced every two years, or when a filter fault occurs.

Filter replacement can be performed with the detector mounted in place.

Replacement Procedure

- 1. Turn off 24V power to the detector.
- 2. Remove the Fascia. Refer to Section 7.3 for further information.




Figure 7-5: Remove filter retaining screws

- 3. Remove the seven circled screws (A) (Figure 7-5).

4. Lift the lid with the foam filters installed inside




Figure 7-6: Lift the filter out from the detector




Figure 7-7: Tube Release Mechanism




Figure 7-8: Tabs




Figure 7-9: Tabs used to remove top and bottom cover




Figure 7-10: Remove pipes and cable




Figure 7-11: Remove pipes




Figure 7-12: Remove cable




Figure 7-13: Remove power cable




Figure 7-14: Remove pump retaining screws




Figure 7-15: Remove pump




Figure 7-16: Pump removed




Figure 7-17: Disconnect pipes




Figure 7-18: Disconnect pipe




Figure 7-19: Remove cables




Figure 7-20: Disconnect power cable




Figure 7-21: Remove rotary valve retaining screws




Figure 7-22: Remove rotary valve retaining screws




Figure 7-23: Remove rotary valve




Figure 7-24: Detector after the Rotary Valve has been removed




Figure 7-25: Disconnect data loom




Figure 7-26: Smoke Test Port Pipes




Figure 7-27: Disconnect Smoke Test Port Pipes




Figure 7-28: Remove the pipe




Figure 7-29: Remove the smoke sensor cable




Figure 7-30: Disconnect pipe




Figure 7-31: Remove Smoke Sensor Module retaining screws




Figure 7-32: Remove Smoke Sensor Module retaining screws




Figure 7-33: Remove Smoke Sensor Module

8 Troubleshooting

If the VEA-040-A00 detector identifies a fault condition, the Fault LED on the front of the detector illuminates and an event containing details of the condition is written to the active event list.

The Xtralis VSC or iVESDA software can be used to obtain specific information on the event to enable further investigation and correction of the fault. The Xtralis VSC Online Help contains descriptions of each fault and recommended corrective actions.

8.1 Detector Status Information




Figure 8-1: Detector Status Information

8.1.1 Scanning State

The Scanning State field in the Detector Status Information dialog (Figure 8-1) provides additional information about the function the detector is currently performing. The following table explains each indicator:

8.2 Fault Reporting through Relays

VESDA-E devices are often interfaced with Fire Alarm Control Panels (FACPs) or building management systems (BMS) via relays. In such instances the fault relays signal a fault condition to the FACP or the BMS. Use the Xtralis VSC software to further investigate the fault.

8.3 Troubleshooting with Xtralis VSC

The Xtralis VSC software displays faults in the active event list as they occur. The list displays the date and time of the fault, the serial number of the device on which the fault has occurred, the zone number, fault number, and a description of the fault.

The fault is removed from the active event list once it is cleared.

A StaX Modules

A.1 Local Relay StaX

The VESDA-E Local Relay StaX allows signaling of alarm location from the detector via relays and provides mounting of fire panel loop input modules inside the enclosure.



A.1.4 How the Local Relay StaX works

When the VESDA-E VEA-040-A00 detector detects an alarm it then scans to determine which tubes have smoke present. The Local Relay StaX will turn on the relays corresponding to each pipe for which smoke has been found.

- Relay Mapping: Relays 1 to 40 correspond to tubes 1 to 40 for the detector, or Expansion Module 1 or 2.
- Latching: The Local Relay StaX relay latching will follow the detectors Alarm latching configuration.





Figure A-4: Rear dimensions - Wall Bracket




Figure A-5: Rear dimensions - Direct Mour	ting

A.1.7 Installation Requirements

Prerequisites

- · A completed system design.
- A 24V DC Power Supply, compliant with local codes and standards. The supply may also power the detector.
- Screws and inserts that are appropriate for the mounting surface.
- Cable glands that are compliant with the IP rating of the enclosure.
- · Conduit, as specified in the system design.
- 0.2 mm² to 1.5 mm² (24 -16 AWG) wiring for relays.
- A PC or laptop installed with Xtralis VSC for initial configuration.

A.1.8 Mounting the Local Relay StaX using the Mounting Bracket

The Local Relay StaX can be mounted above or below the detector. A spacer has been provided to precisely align the Local Relay StaX mounting bracket with the detector mounting bracket.

For general mounting position guidelines, refer to Section 4.2 on page 23.

Mounting Procedure

1. Position the mounting bracket spacer (A) immediately above or below the detector mounting bracket (B), which has been previously secured to the mounting surface. If required, remove the detector first.




Figure A-6: Position the Mounting Bracket Spacer above or below the detector mounting bracket

2. Align the Local Relay StaX Mounting Bracket (C) with the spacer (B), and secure it to the mounting surface (Figure A-7), then remove the spacer.




Figure A-7: Position and secure the Local Relay StaX Mounting Bracket




Figure A-8: Fit the Local Relay StaX to its mounting bracket




Figure A-9: Secure the Local Relay StaX to its mounting bracket




Figure A-10: Place the Mounting Bracket spacer on top of the detector

3. Place the Local Relay StaX on top of the detector. Mark positions for four pilot holes on the mounting surface through keyholes in the back of the Local Relay StaX.




Figure A-11: Position mounting template




Figure A-12: Insert mounting screws

5. Reposition the Local Relay StaX above the detector, inserting the two mounting screws into their respective keyholes (Figure A-13).




Figure A-13: Reposition the Local Relay StaX above the detector

6. Insert the third and fourth mounting screw and tighten all four (Figure A-14).




Figure A-14: Tighten Mounting Screws





Figure A-15: Local Relay StaX Relay PCA






Figure A-18: Insert Trays into the enclosure




Figure A-19: Secure Trays to the enclosure




Figure A-20: Attach the Fascia




Figure A-21: Relay PCA Configuration Jumpers





Figure A-22: Relay Module enabled in Xtralis VSC

A.1.13 Commissioning

Select the Alarm Test command in the Device Menu.






Figure A-23: Relay Testing

Select the relays to be tested and press "Start". The detector will stop normal smoke detection and will go into alarm with the selected relays turned on. (The main detector Alarm relays will also be turned on.) The alarm test function will stop automatically after the selected "Active for" time. Or the user can stop the function by selecting "Stop".

Note: This function will cause an alarm to be signaled via the relays in the Local Relay StaX and the detector's relays.

D	Disable	When the detector is disabled the detector will not signal alarms and faults via its relays. The detector signals that it is disabled using Relay 1. (Disable was previously referred to as isolate.)
E	Event Log	A data log of events (for example, alarms, troubles, user commands) which is stored in the detector.
F	Fault	An urgent fault is a condition where the system requires urgent attention as it may be unable to detect an alarm condition.
		A minor fault is a condition where the system requires attention or maintenance, but is still able to detect an alarm condition.
	Fire Alarm Control Panel (FACP)	A central monitoring and control system to which all smoke detectors report their status.
G	General Purpose Input (GPI) Unmonitored	An input to the detector which can be used to initiate a user configurable action. Applying a voltage between 5V and 30VDC triggers the selected action.
	General Purpose Input (GPI) Monitored	The monitored GPI senses contact closure and is configurable to initiate the same actions as the unmonitored GPI. In particular, it can be used to monitor the power supply.
Н	High Airflow Environment	Where there are 10 or more air exchanges per hour.
	High Level Interface (HLI)	A communications interface between a VESDA device and other pieces of equipment using another communications protocol.
